## Ted Williamson, MD, CTR, Receives the OCRA Lifetime Honorary Member Award

Dr. Williamson, Founder, former President, and Medical Director of Onco, Inc., had an opportunity to participate as a consultant in the development of a new radiation therapy facility in 1970 which led to an appreciation for the cancerfighting power of radiation and his first experience developing a computer-based cancer registry. A career-changing decision steered him to an MD at the University of Miami in 1975. Returning to the West Coast, he completed his residency in radiation oncology at the University Hospital in Seattle. His group practice in radiation oncology allowed time to pursue research and the development of interests, first in radiation treatment planning and then, since 1986, exclusively in cancer registry and related software applications. In addition to his decades of registry work for Onco Inc., Dr. Williamson has been on the staff of Salem Hospital for 40 years and has been a member of the Oregon State Cancer Registry Advisory Board since it was founded. He earned his CTR credential in 1994. Dr. Williamson has remained committed to the Cancer Registry field, fellow CTR's, and OCRA.
